### OWs Remember Fallen Whitgiftians

A team of ten Old Whitgiftian Rugby Club members paid an emotional, humbling and poignant visit in July to the graves of 31 OWs and former players who lost their lives in the First World War in Northern France and Belgium.

Covering more than 750 miles across 25 burial sites in just four days, the group laid poppy wreaths at each grave. A specially commissioned Gilbert rugby ball based on the design used in 1914 and featuring the names of the 40 players was also placed at each grave.



The trip was organised to coincide with the centenary of the outbreak of the war after it was spotted on the clubhouse Honours Board that Tom Hipsey had just equalled the eight season record of Frank Benton as the longest serving 1<sup>st</sup> XV Captain. 2<sup>nd</sup> Lieutenant Benton's tenure as skipper ended in 1914 and further research revealed that he was killed in action at Deville Wood in 1916. His name is also inscribed along with 39 other OWs on the simple wooden memorial board at the Whitgift Sports Club entrance.

The Commonwealth War Graves Commission supplied precise locations for each grave allowing full and effective planning of the trip. However, learning more about each player was a central feature of the visit.

School archivist William Wood provided information about each rugby club member to die during the conflict including details of their school record, military service and death. The School's records revealed that many of the players were recognised for their bravery in battle with three Military Crosses and one Distinguished Service Order awarded as well as seven soldiers mentioned in Dispatches - each a harrowing, but inspiring tale of Whitgiftian bravery.

Each soldier's tale was shared with the group at his grave before a minute's silence, which was broken with the words "We will remember them".

In total, 40 players from the rugby club gave their lives. The other Old Whitgiftian rugby players who lost their lives in the First World War are buried in locations including Egypt, Gallipoli and Jerusalem.

The rugby club's commemorations began on 3rd July with a mem-



orial service at the School's War Memorial to remember the 248 Old Whitgiftians who died in the First World War. The service was followed by a dinner in the School's Old Library attended by 50 OWs and guests.

One commemorative ball has been donated to the Rugby Football Union while another will be displayed at the OWRFC's headquarters at Whitgift Sports Club in Croham Manor Road, South Croydon.

The 40 OWRFC players who died in WWI had an average age of 26. Frederick Foot (died from his injuries, 11th March 1919) was the oldest at 38, while Albert Flower (Killed in Action, 11th March 1916, Arras) and Kenneth Greenaway (Killed in Action, 27th November 1915, Gallipoli) were the youngest at just 19 years old.

A short video of the trip is being produced and will be shown at a rugby club lunch on 15th November, the match day nearest to Remembrance Sunday. We would welcome all OWs and their guests to join the lunch where the tourists will also talk more about the memorable trip. *Jonathan Bunn*

The running distances rise by 2km every weekday, to 14km on Sundays. The time period (97 days) has been carefully planned: Charlie was born in 1997 and 97 days equates to 14 weeks. The 14km run each Sunday represents 1km for each of Charlie's 14 years.

Since Charlie's death in 2012, his two older brothers, Sam and Tom, have been showing their appreciation to the RLNI for all their efforts on that tragic day. The brothers' first fundraiser was the BUPA Great South Run in 2012, and since then they 've taken part in the London Marathon, a Half Ironman and a 14km swim from Henley to Marlow. Collectively Team Hutton has raised almost £20,000.

Speaking about the Challenge, Sam said: "We wanted to create something that everyone can take part in and to inspire others to take up the challenge by running and getting fit. Charlie stood for sport, he stood for health and he stood for fitness."

In the Aggregate Competition, we finished 7<sup>th</sup> out of 9. Five of our 15 were shooting their first match for a year, with a couple using the club Musgrave rifles for the first time. That is probably enough from me for now. I shall cover Small Bore shooting and our continued association with the school shooting club in the next report.



### News from the School

Whitgift has enjoyed yet another spectacular year but it is not news regarding the boys that has made it to the top of this column: It is the retirement of a special member of staff. After 35 years of service to both the school and Old Boys, Fladders has left the building. Phil Fladgate's exploits in the classroom and on the sports fields will be remembered fondly by thousands of OWs. It is only just to pay tribute to his exploits in a column that has been synonymous with his name. One positive aspect of his retirement is that it will free him up to become a full time supporter of the School and OW teams, so you will have plenty of opportunities to see him and chew the fat over glory days when strolling the touch lines in the years to come.

The 2013-14 school year came to a rapturous end with *Celebration of Whitgift Life*. Literary genius and esteemed Old Whitgiftian Neil Gaiman (*pictured*), was guest speaker. He spoke movingly about his time at the school and how advice he was given by a particular member of staff helped shape the man he is today. Doubtless the highlight of his day was awarding the House Championship Cup to Mason's (won for the second year in a row, I might



add!) The cup was gratefully received by departing School Captain, Geddy Stringer, who earlier on had left the audience spellbound with a reprisal of his role as West Side Story's doomed lover, Tony.

Whilst the Celebration of Whitgift Life pays tribute to all aspects of school life, the majority of prizes are academic. This was exemplified the next day with the International Baccalaureate (IB) results: All 30 candidates achieved the prestigious diploma, averaging an impressive 37 points. Daniel Alsoof and Kavish Shah achieved the maximum of 45 points, and Kavish, having taken four Higher Level subjects, instead of the usual three, can claim to be the highest achieving IB candidate to have taken the diploma at Whitgift. This places him in the top few candidates globally. This pleasing trend was continued with another bumper crop of A-Level results: Boys achieved 88.17% at A\*-B grade. Impressive for a school of this size.

With regards sporting excellence, James Wyatt (a Mason's boy, coincidentally) won the Pioneer Cup, Europe's premier junior squash tournament in Cologne, on 3<sup>rd</sup> July. The 14 year old is now ranked number one in Europe U15. Recent leavers, Dominic Sibley and Henry Cheeseman, (both Mason's boys) have continued to excel in professional sport in cricket and rugby respectively - Dominic scored copious amounts of runs in the recent U19 test series against South Africa, and Henry achieved success for Harlequins in the 7s form.

Whitgift's 6<sup>th</sup> Form Modern Pentathlete, Henry Choong, has been selected to represent GB at this Summer's Youth Olympic Games in China. He is part of the 33-strong Team GB squad, competing in Nanjing, 16-28<sup>th</sup> August. Henry's

older brother Joseph OW made his senior international debut at the modern pentathlon European Championships, in Hungary, in July. Meanwhile, fellow OW Sam Curry (2005-12), made sure Britain's competition ended on a high note, by winning bronze in the men's relay.

Three Old Whitgiftians took part in the EuroHockey Junior Nations Championship, in Belgium, on 26<sup>th</sup> July - an impressive England representation from a single school. OWs Luke Taylor, Rob Farrington, and Jonty Griffiths (Mason's), all now studying at Loughborough University were part of the England U21 team who beat the hosts 4-3, securing a dramatic bronze medal win. Finally, the cricket 1<sup>st</sup> XI won ten fixtures, but unfortunately went out of the national cup in a tight loss to Tonbridge School.

Whitgift is blooming - figuratively and literally - having won the crown in the London in Bloom - Sow, Grow and Know 2014 competition. 28 schools were judged against stringent criteria, with categories such as 'sustainability' and 'use of grounds for school curriculum'. The judges said that 'Whitgift School is one of the jewels in the crown of London and the South East' - high praise indeed. Head Groundsman, Stuart Webber, Head Gardener, Sophie Tatzkow and their dedicated teams deserve our congratulations.

Whilst my pedigree might not yet be on a par with Fladders, I like to think I am getting there. Thus far, I have spent 21 years at Whitgift – 8 as a boy and 13 as a member of staff (including 10 as Housemaster of a certain House: see if you can guess which one). I've loved every single one of them. I will endeavour to continue Phil's excellent work.
