## OW CALLS FOR HELP IN NEPAL

On April 25th 2015, a devastating earthquake hit central Nepal. In just 90 seconds, more than 9,000 people died.

2.4 million people became instantly homeless. 32,000 classrooms were destroyed – and nearly one million Nepali school children lost both their homes and their schools.

For five years, Learning Planet has been working with rural communities in Gorkha district to bring clean energy, water, IT and communications, teacher training, and new school buildings. We were working in Gorkha, when the earthquake struck. Just 12 miles from the epicenter.

We were able to respond very quickly. With our local partners, Abari, and 25 volunteers, distributing hundreds of blankets, mattresses, and tarpaulins. Miraculously, we lost only one soul in Dhawa, despite pulling more than 50 people from rubble. Logistics and resources were challenged almost immediately with the sheer scale of the disaster.

We sent our workers home to their own villages to help their own families. As the larger international relief agencies began to arrive, a week after the earthquake, every city ran out of tarpualins, and tons of



international supplies became stuck in the chaotic international airport. When we finally reached our workers' remote villages (on foot), no other assistance had yet arrived.

The monsoon was imminent, and so many were homeless. Together we designed a re-

useable transitional shelter that anyone could build, with materials people already had available to them. We produced a simple manual for ways to construct it - with salvaged wood, stone and tin, plus bamboo, earth and grass.

Two weeks on and people began to go hungry – their stores of rice and corn, lost. Hundreds of

families had been left completely without food. As help from neighbours and friends began to dry up, we lobbied the World Food Programme to assist. But there were too many affected.

Thanks to the OW appeal, we dispatched 21 tons of rice to all 968 homes in Dhawa. Although massively over stretched, The World Food Programme has since picked up the pace in Gorkha.

And some world-leading NGOs – notably Save the Children and People in Need – began their sophisticated operations.

With great relief, we were able to re-focus and ponder the next problem – how to get thousands of children back to school in less than a fortnight. We designed an inexpensive, high-quality, safe and sturdy structure that could be a classroom or health post – deployed very quickly, with just bamboo, canvas and rope.

In collaboration with Tents to Nepal, we brought truck loads of canvas. With this canvas, and with assistance from the OW appeal, 94 safe, weatherproof, temporary classrooms were constructed and thousands of traumatised kids got a little normality back. Before the Monsoon came, Dhawa's 1,300 school children, and those in nearly 20 other villages were all in class.

Since the rains have arrived, our focus has shifted again. We've developed a modular school design that uses local, sustainable materials to create inexpensive, seismically safe classrooms, that are flexible, communal, affordable and fun.

Our aim is to replace concrete school blocks with an inspiring child-friendly model with durability, seismic protection, thermal efficiency, sustainability and flexibility; which goes up faster, and costs

We're hugely grateful to OWs for giving us the opportunity to work with communities in Nepal who are already taking small steps towards that leap.

# WHITGIFT SPORTS CLUB REMEMBERS LIVES LOST IN WORLD WARS

On Sunday 12th July more than 100 members of the Whitgift Sports Club attended the unveiling ceremony and dedication of a Memorial to the 113 members who gave their lives in the two World Wars.

The Memorial, a bronze plaque embedded in a granite block, was generously donated by the OW Trustees via the War Memorial Fund and is situated on the grass bank to the right of the Cricket Scoreboard.



Those present were welcomed by the WSC Chairman, Alan Cowing (OW 1953-59).

Mike Greenwood, a Trustee and Director of the Woodland Trust (which has given 500 saplings to the Club as part of the Trust's World War 1 Centenary Commemorations) gave an interesting insight into the work of the Trust and congratulated the Club on its involvement with the project.



Sir Peter Wall (OW 1965-73) highlighted the sacrifice made by those who gave their lives in a moving address and The Reverend Canon Colin Boswell, Vicar of Croydon and Whitgift

School Chaplain, dedicated the memorial with a blessing.

After the Last Post, beautifully sounded by Charles Sladdin, a current Whitgift Sixth Form student, the gathering retired to the Clubhouse for drinks and canapes.

# Triumph on the Western Front

Phil Holdway-Davis, OW (1971-76) visited the WA Office and Whitgift archives in July en route to the St. George's Memorial Church in Ypres, as part of the launch of his new book, "Triumph on the Western Front".

Phil has compiled the book from the diaries of his Great Uncle, WWI Despatch Rider, Owald H Davis.

Oswald joined the Royal Engineers in 1916 and arrived in Abbeville, Somme, France in July that year. He was dished out a Triumph motorcycle to carry pigeons and vital messages at a time when communications were limited and risky.

Oswald H Davis is no newcomer to the literary world; as a poet and novelist he has written twelve books. His war diary, Triumph on the Western Front, is the last piece of his literature to be published. He

takes the reader on a vivid trip from wartime Britain in July 1915 to his voluntary recruitment where he is sent to the Somme and Flanders for the duration of the war. He finishes with a post-war trip to occupied Germany before demobilisation in February 1919. A decent fellow who openly admitted he wasn't really 'adept' at war and what it involved.

You can laugh at his lighthearted humour and his love for the ladies, and yet he invokes a sympathy in the reader when he concedes to making numerous mistakes – after all he was only human."

Phil, who lives in New Zealand, plans to visit Croydon for the "Remembering 1916 exhibition", which will be held at Whitgift School from March

2016. He hopes to be available to sign books and talk about Oswald, the Somme, the ANZACs and pigeons!



Whilst it is only a little over a decade old, the end of year extravaganza that is the Celebration of Whitgift Life (ominously referred to as COWL by the staff in the plethora of organizational emails which precede it) is fast becoming associated with a number of traditions, and this year was no different. Firstly, it will be accompanied by a searing heatwave: this year, the preceding Wednesday was on record as the hottest June day ever! Secondly, the entertainment interludes will make you forget that you are in a school, such are their quality: the excerpt from the Lower School Musical Spamalot really did make you forget your troubles and look on the bright side of life, and the table tennis exhibition match had to be seen to be believed. Thirdly, the guest speaker will pitch their speech perfectly, making pithy, motivational comments, aware of the fact that they are the only person standing between nearly 1,500 school boys (and over 150 staff!) and their Summer holidays - to that end, Chairman of the Whitgift Foundation, Christopher Houlding, we salute you! Finally, your hands will start to ache due to clapping the sheer number of boys receiving prizes!

The end of the Summer Term also heralded the first academic success of the year, with the IB class of 2015 receiving their initial results on Sunday 5th July. An average total points score of nearly 38 is already up on last year, with three quarters of the boys scoring over 35 points, and just over a third scoring 40 and above. The vast majority of the cohort has achieved what they need to gain places at Russell Group universities, including Oxford and Cambridge, and in the United States.


The Drama and Music departments have a long history of combining harmoniously to put on first rate productions and this Summer was no different, with the school

putting on not one, but two highly contrasting shows. The first, Lower School musical, Spamalot, featured another huge cast and showcased the talents of Jude Willoughby and Macauley Keeper, who have both already enjoyed great success on the small screen.

The second was a very interesting project: Director, Mr Paul Wilson, and his highlytalented cast, ranging from First to Lower Sixth Formers, took on the monumental task of performing Summer's Last Will and Testament, by the Elizabethan writer, Thomas Nashe. The comedy, first performed at the end of the sixteenth century, was commissioned by the School's Founder, Archbishop John Whitgift, to entertain the visiting monarch, when visiting his Croydon residence. Never has there been a performance with such historical links to the School; fittingly performed in the beautiful Founder's Garden.

The occasion, towards the end of the Trinity Term, also served to mark the book launch of a biography celebrating the life of John Whitgift - written by the Headmaster - the first to be published for

nearly fifty years. Dr Barnett thanked the Whitgift Foundation for supporting the publication, as well as Mr Wilson for indulging his idea of bringing the Nashe play to fruition. The audience, some dressed in Elizabethan costume, were delighted by the unique nature of the event, and were thoroughly impressed by the young actors, who delivered the highly-intellectual script with aplomb beyond their years, and the graceful dancers. Musical interludes included performances by Whitgift choristers, and superb solos by Mr Wilson and Mr Alan Weakley.

As if contributing heavily to two theatrical productions was not enough, the Music Department also undertook its second International Music Competition, following the success of the first one in 2013. In June, the school welcomed 18 young musicians from 10 countries around the world, to compete for a variety of prestigious awards, including the Grand Prize of a full boarding scholarship to the school, won this year by Hungarian cellist, Marcel Leczky, who stunned the adjudicators and audience with his virtuosic rendition of the Popper -Hungarian Rhapsody. In order to ensure more entries from the UK and around the

world for the 2017 competition, which will be open to string, woodwind and brass players, Whitgift welcomes any offers of support from Old Whitgiftians, particularly in respect of assistance for pupils who go on to gain entry to London Conservatoires. 
The biggest news on the sporting front comes from the school's golfers, who after decades of trying, finally won the "Ryder Cup of school golf", the HMC foursomes competition. The finals this year were played at local course, Purley Downs, over two scorching days. On the first day, the school beat Reigate and tournament giants, Millfield, setting up an epic semifinal with Loretto on the second day, which was clinched in dramatic fashion by the third pair (with the scores tied at 1 - 1 after the first two pairs' efforts) who needed 19 holes to decide their match. The final was against Wellington College and proved to be just as tense. In a topsyturvy affair, the first two matches both went to the 18th green, with the first pair sealing their win with some breathtaking golf, being several shots under par, and the second pair clinching their victory with a 20 foot putt!

Whilst the Cricket Season did not see any major trophies won by the end of the year, the U13A side, who went unbeaten throughout the term, were still going strong in their National Cup, having reached the area semi-finals. The First XI were knocked out of their National Cup at the quarter-final stage by Reed's, but they still enjoyed a fantastic season, only losing two games and winning 17, including notable victories over Trinity, the MCC and a touring Australian side, St Paul's from Brisbane, who were trounced by 287 runs... now where have we heard that before?

In other sports news, Whitgift's stock in the modern pentathlon just keeps on rising, with two more boys winning national titles. Rudi Bruijn-Yard finished the season on a high, claiming the U13 British title at the 2015 British Pentathlon Championships, in June, in Solihull. This is an outstanding achievement for the Upper First Form pupil, especially given that he only started horse riding last year. Whitgift can also claim an U16 national champion, with Upper Fifth pupil, Charlie Goriup, winning the British Schools Biathle, meaning he is now ranked number one at U17 level.

# RECORD-BREAKING A LEVEL RESULTS


