

On Friday, November 13th, our President, Sir Keith Lindblom, hosted a dinner in the Old Library for Vice Presidents of the Whitgiftian Association.

As is customary, however, past Presidents were also invited to attend and we were fortunate that John Lindblom (1992), Ken Rokison (1995), Derek Tullett (1999), Gordon Garment (2004), Mike Wilkinson (2005), John Straw (2007), Peter Warren (2008), Ian Flanagan (2010), Pip Burley (2011) and David Stranack (2014) were all able to attend.

Following a light hearted welcome from the President, an excellent dinner was served, punctuated by a stunning performance on solo violin by lower sixth former Ion Mo§neaga from Moldova who played "Zigeurnerweisen" (Gypsy Airs)



written by the Spanish composer Pablo Sarasate in 1847, one of his most popular compositions and a favourite among violin virtuosos. Well, 17-year old Ion certainly gave us a virtuoso performance of a challenging piece which, with its familiar Romany themes, had the effect of transforming the Old Library into a Hungarian Cellar Café! It was a treat for all those present and warmly appreciated. Thank you, Ion.



Following dinner, Sir Keith spoke about the importance of OWs mentoring their younger counterparts, not only when they have just have left school, but perhaps more importantly when they are at university. He felt that as well as providing advice at the School Careers
Conversazione and the occasional
provision of work experience during school
holidays, true mentoring involved taking a
long-lasting interest in a younger OW
throughout his career. He recalled fondly
how his early days in the legal profession
were greatly enhanced by his OW mentor,
with whom he has retained a lasting
friendship. He hoped that as a matter of
priority the WA would launch a full-scale
mentoring programme in the foreseeable
future and invited OWs who were
prepared to help to contact him directly or
via the WA office.

Past President and current Chairman of the Association, Pip Burley, then talked about raising funds for bursaries. He explained that in collaboration with the School's Admissions Office, the WA had recently presented a fundraising programme to School and Foundation Governors which had been greeted with enthusiasm. Starting in January 2016, the WA Bursary Appeal will have an objective of raising £250,000 in year one, which would help fund a further twenty boys from the Croydon community to attend Whitgift. Pip finished by asking those present to assist with helping the scheme get off to a good start.

A most enjoyable evening was wound up with a hearty rendition of 'Carmen' from all present.

Chris Houlding, old

What are the most significant changes that you have seen at the Foundation over the past 10 years?

and the work of the Foundation.

In recent years our activities have increased with the joining of Wilhelmina House to the Foundation, the merger of Croham Hurst School with Old Palace and, most recently, the opening of the Carers' Support



Centre. We now have eight committees overseeing all aspects of the Foundation's charitable activities from finance to external relations. There are currently 17 Court Governors, each bringing a diverse and valuable spread of experience and expertise. Court meetings can be lively although debate is always constructive and effective.

What has your involvement been in the redevelopment of the Whitgift Centre?

It might seem like a straightforward exercise to revive a 40 year old shopping centre but in fact it has been an extremely complex undertaking. This is in part due to the complicated ownership structure but also because of the need to consider the interests of a number of key external stakeholders. With the redevelopment

expected to cost around £1billion, it was important to find development partners who had the vision, proven expertise and financial resources to see the project delivered to the quality that Croydon deserves. It has been an incredibly lengthy process and we have had to work with a number of external advisors both to look after the Foundation's interests, and also to help create a scheme of the quality that Croydon can be proud of for years to come.

How did your time at Trinity impact on your future career?

Although my academic achievement at Trinity was probably rather average compared with the standards of today's students, the school left me with a set of values that have served me extremely well in adult life. Values that say it's good to be confident and proud in high achievement but it's equally important to show humility and respect for others. I see these values running true today – indeed they are firmly imprinted in the DNA of the entire Foundation.



which provides free education for less well-off children. During the 2015 Summer holidays, I was working in Minami-Sanriku, where a terrible earthquake and tsunami struck in 2011. For the first two years, a large amount of money was donated to help improve the situation. But recently, the effects of the tsunami are not being reported.

Earlier last year, Yuki Hayashi, a Sixth Form boarder in the Founder's House, approached the WA for financial help with his community project in his tsunami damaged homeland. This request was referred to the War Memorial Trust Fund committee who examined all the relevant documentation and once satisfied, awarded him a grant to cover his additional travel expenses. His report follows:-

The importance of awareness

In 2014, I first volunteered for an organization in Japan called 'Kids' Door',


Although it might be believed that the reconstruction of disaster-stricken areas has been going smoothly, this is not the reality. When I arrived at Minami-Sanriku, I was alarmed by the scene in front of my eyes: There were few houses and shops. Small weeds were growing, drearily covering massive patches of bare land, and soil had been piled up to create foundations for houses which will be constructed in the future.

People still do not have permanent houses. The students I taught in Minami-Sanriku were all living in temporary homes.

While volunteering, I was repeatedly told not to talk to local students about their personal backgrounds, especially their families. We were told that unless a student broaches the subject, we should not discuss these topics as we do not know the impact of the disaster on families: they might have experienced the loss of family members, or traumatic incidents. I felt very strongly about this: I felt it was of the upmost importance to carefully consider how to interact with people who have dealt with overwhelming experiences.

All the students there were very inquisitive. They asked me so many questions, not only about their studies, but also about what it is like in the UK. I have been immensely encouraged by their positive attitudes and aspirations for the future. I would like to take the initiative to help take steps forward to reconstruct Minami-Sanriku, and facilitate a community where more and more people actively support each other.

As I sat applauding vigorously during the final curtain call of this term's outstanding school production, Journey's End, I could not help but think what an appropriate choice of play this was. The first, and most obvious, reason for this assertion is that it is play set during the First World War, and the school is preparing for a major exhibition exploring the wide ranging impact of the conflict. There is also the fact that renowned Old Whitgiftian actor, Leon Quartermaine (OW 1886-93), starred in the American premiere on Broadway in 1929. It is also a play that was performed early on in the current Headmaster's regime, and so the figurative connotations of the title are rather fitting, given that Dr Barnett is coming to the end of his time at Whitgift. Another continuity between the two productions is the irrepressible Mr Paul Wilson, who directed them both. Paul has been a legend of Whitgift drama for the past twenty years and having watched many of his productions, I can confidently say that this one was right up there with his very best.

Journey's End was not the only performance to light up the Whitgift stage during the dark winter months. The annual student-led Lower Sixth form play got things underway just before half term, with the boys bravely taking on Nobel Prize winner, Dario Fo's internationally-recognised political farce, Accidental Death of an Anarchist. Head

of Drama, Mrs Miranda Merrett, was full of praise, commenting, "This is quite an exceptional achievement for the boys: the way they engaged with the characters and the complicated political background of the play was impressive, and they can be very proud of what they managed to do in such a short period of time." The annual jamboree that is House Drama followed swiftly after half term, with Smith's winning the evening with a riproaring rendition of Monty Python's The Funniest Joke in the World sketch. Lastly, and not to be outdone, the lower end of the school also treated us to a fantastic evening, with thirty four boys from the First Form putting on four short plays under the directorship of four Sixth Formers. All in all, a very dramatic term!

The Music department has also been busy. As we have come to expect, the Autumn Collection Concert at Fairfield Halls was a veritable feast for the ears, with the Last Night of the Proms repertoire going down a treat with the audience. Indeed, the massed ranks of the First Form choir ended up having to sing Jerusalem twice, such was the clamour that erupted from the vocal crowd!

The choristers were particularly busy into the last couple of weeks of term, singing at the Ritz and Hanover Square, before returning to their spiritual home to lead the carol service at the Croydon Minster. Their dulcet tones having been recorded

onto a CD which is now available to purchase from the WA online shop. The rugby term ended on high, with all three national cup teams - U13A, U15A and First XV – progressing though to the final rounds of their respective cups on the final 'Super' Thursday of term. The Firsts' game was professionally recorded and streamed live on the England rugby website. Another exciting development in Whitgift rugby is the school's partnership with cutting edge concussion management company, Return2Play, which was founded by OWs Dr Sam Barke (2000-05) and Nick Somers (1984-89). Their concussion management system ensures compliance with the new Rugby Football Union guidelines to improve player welfare.


The U16 Hockey side have won the South Indoor Hockey Championships yet again, beating Trinity in the final. This means that they have qualified for the Nationals in January. Unfortunately, the U18s did not quite make it, losing 3-2 at the semi-stage to a very good Dr Challoner's side. One quite remarkable statistic to reflect just how strong Whitgift hockey has been in the past few years, is the fact that no fewer than six recent leavers represented the Great Britain U21 side in the prestigious Sultan of Johor Cup. The selection is seen as a good indication of who England Hockey has their sights set on for the next Olympics cycle. Naturally, with such a strong OW influence, Great Britain only went and won the whole thing, beating India in the final!

In other sports news, the U13 Cross Country team won the ESSA Cross Country Cup – basically the National

Final. This is only the second time ever that Whitgift have qualified for this level of competition. Four of our six runners finished in the top 20 out of 142 runners. Harley Norman was Whitgift's highest finisher with individual silver.

They have qualified for the England Schools' Table Tennis Association Jack Petchey Zone Finals, to be held in January.

The programme complements and builds on Surrey CCC's County Age Group Programme, which develops home-grown talent, and allows the Club to spend more time with emerging talent.

Countdown to "Remembering 1916 -Life on the Western Front"

In focusing on the pivotal year of 1916 this centenary exhibition will explore the year, both chronologically and thematically and provide context by walking visitors through time. It will close with the opportunity to reflect on the memory of those who lost their lives and the new world order of 1918

The Performing Arts Centre has undergone extensive refurbishment and has been transformed into the new Whitgift Exhibition Centre. The Exhibition Project Team have catalogued and researched more than 500 objects. These artefacts are mainly drawn from the extensive collections of five generous private collectors including Old Whitgiftians. Many are extremely rare, either being the

couple known to have survived. By bringing these items together, a narrative is created, which has not previously been told. Visitors to the exhibition will be

able to follow the threads of the lives of British, French and German servicemen and women, and their loved ones.

Key items to look out for include two original first issues of the British trench newspaper, The Wipers Times, known for its wry sense of humour; rare examples of uniforms and equipment; a rare

pattern of the British Brodie helmet; an early Women's Royal Air Force uniform; an original sign from Verdun train

station, the town being the site of the bloodiest battle of the war; and a piece of fabric from the famous red tri-plane flown by the Red Baron, Manfred von Richthofen.

Art lovers will be able to take in examples of

contemporary work in a contrasting range of styles. Highlights include a set of detailed original

pastel portraits of allied soldiers; a series of hard-hitting graphic political cartoons; and an impressive selection of iconic recruitment posters. Crucially, for an exhibition looking at the political and social background to World War One and the events of 1916, the exhibition will also draw on the voices,

recollections, writings and opinions of British, French and German soldiers and their families. A number of these lives have strong Whitgift connections.

In the last room of the exhibition,
Remembering 1916 will respectfully acknowledge the 251 Old Whitgiftians and Whitgift Masters

who lost their lives during the Great War. A display of 251 crafted metal poppies will provide a reflective culmination to the show, alongside the profiles of each man. Visitors will be able to purchase these poppies should they wish to do so.
